JOINING INSTRUCTIONS FOR THE KOREA SYMPOSIUM

1. On behalf of the Commandant of the Canadian Forces College (CFC), Brigadier-General D.C. Hilton, welcome to the Korea Symposium, sponsored by the Centre for National Security Studies (CNSS).

AIM

2. The aim of the Korea Symposium is to explore the national security issues facing Korea and the possible impact on global security. The CFC's definition of national security is:

"The preservation of a way of life acceptable to the Canadian people and compatible with the needs and legitimate aspirations of others. It includes freedom from military attack or coercion, freedom from international subversion, and freedom from erosion of the political, economic, and social values which are essential to the quality of life in Canada."

CONTENT

3. The Korea Symposium curriculum is presented through three presentations by panels of experts and keynote addresses to encourage discussions. The proposed schedule includes:

a. Panel 1: *Strategic Surprise: How do we continue to get caught?*

(1) Keynote Address 1: *American Perspective*; and

(2) Keynote Address 2: *Chinese Perspective*.

b. Panel 2: *Through what method will Korea be unified?*

c. Panel 3: *Should/How should Canada engage?*

d. Panel 4: *How will a unified Korea redefine the region?*

4. All material presented by the speakers should be of an unclassified nature. Contributors to the Korea Symposium have been assured that they will be given a "Privileged Platform" and thus will not be quoted by name, either orally or in writing. The College's policy of non-attribution was established and is carefully guarded to encourage candour in all aspects of the Symposium. *It is the responsibility of each member of the Symposium to ensure that this guarantee is honoured in full.* Presentations are not normally recorded, and never without the speaker's knowledge and prior agreement. Participants may take notes during any part of the Symposium, but all personal electronic devices are to be turned off in the auditorium.

SYMPOSIUM START AND END

5. The Symposium will commence at 0800 hours, Tuesday, 8 Nov 11, in Traynor Auditorium, located in Curtis Hall at the CFC. Transportation is not provided for participants to and from the College. The Symposium will end at approximately at 1200 hrs on Thursday, 10 Nov 11.

OFFICIAL LANGUAGES

6. All Canadian Forces personnel and members of the Public Service of Canada are cognizant of Government policy and intentions with regard to the use of both official

languages. At the College, receptive bilingualism applies. However, because of the attendance of foreign officers, as well as non-federal government participants, English will be used as the baseline common language for much of the Symposium.

8. Registration. A registration desk will be located in the lobby of the College from 0700–0815 hrs for participants as they arrive for Day 1 and again for Day 2. Participants are required to sign in at the registration desk upon their arrival. Participants will also receive their welcome package and other symposium materials at this time.

9. Parking. Parking is extremely limited at the College. It is recommended that participants ensure they have a transportation plan in place to facilitate their daily travel needs without the use of their private vehicles to and from the College.

10. Meals. Guest Speakers and Panellists will dine at Armour Heights Officers' Mess (AHOM) for all meals. For participants, lunch is offered at AHOM at participants' expense. Cash payment is the only accepted method of payment for lunch purchases. Any participant with special dietary needs should inform CNSS Administration Staff as soon as possible (see contact data below). **Please note that all commercial meal and hotel costs are the participant's responsibility.**

11. Symposium Dinner. The Korean Embassy will host a symposium meet and greet followed by a symposium dinner at the Armour Heights Officers' Mess from 1700–2100 hrs. Dress for military personnel is DEU with ribbons, and for civilian personnel is business suit equivalent. Cost for this event is being borne by the Korean Embassy. A keynote address will be given by the Korean Ambassador to Canada as part of the dinner.

12. Coffee. The standard Symposium day includes a coffee service in the morning and afternoon at the AHOM, consisting of coffee, tea, a selection of fruit juices, and pastries.

13. College Information System. For security reasons, personal notebook computers will not be connected to the College system. Symposium participants from the CF and DND who have DWAN e-mail accounts may be able to access that information from the DWAN terminals located in the IRC. For civilian and OGD participants, Internet access is achieved via select terminals if so needed. Simply consult with my programme staff and arrangements will be made to support your IT needs.

SMOKING

14. Smoking is not permitted in College facilities, including Curtis, Burns or DeWolf Halls and the Officers' Mess; however, a gazebo located in the centre courtyard of the College has been constructed for smokers' use during break periods. Smoking areas have also been designated outside the solarium and on the small sun porch of the Officers' Mess.
